
SCRATCH BENEATH THE SURFACE

PREVIEW: 02 DEC 2023 5 - 7 PM ON VIEW THROUGH 31 DEC 2023 Art often broadens our perspective toward economic, socio-political, and cultural processes, and shapes and expands our understanding of reality. The exhibition Scratch Beneath the Surface is rooted in art's capability to effect social change and creates a space for voices from the margins to take centre stage. The exhibition presents works by Anshu Singh, Birender Kumar Yadav, Richa Arya, and Thamshangpha Maku.


At once poignant and assertive, the works amplify the voices of marginal communities to which the artists belong and foreground their deliberations with issues of identity, agency, belonging, and the nature of labour. Anshu's and Richa's works examine the gendered division and valuation of labour, where domestic craft practices like embroidery, sewing, and beadwork become a carrier of expression against patriarchy and its operations. The works in the exhibition also present varied understandings of the relationship between the centre and the margin. Thamshangpha's seemingly tranquil landscapes depict the brewing tensions between tribes and the mainland as the centre. While everyday tools within Birender's works act as portraits of labouring castes and classes, embodying their conditions and experiences.

Even though grounded in specific contexts, the works carry echoes of global struggles and resistances, and strive to evaluate normative social conditions and behaviours. Scratch Beneath the Surface not only foregrounds overlooked yet concurrent realities that are crucial to reflect and act upon, but also kindles an introspection at a personal, local, and global level to realise a world where—human rights are upheld and sustained, social and economic security is shared by all, and differences in practices and perspectives are respected and appreciated.











ANSHU SINGH Home Sweat Home, 2022

Beads Embroidery on Paper 12×15.5 in $(30 \times 40 \text{ cm})$







ANSHU SINGH Life of a Thread, 2022

Beads Embroidery on Paper 63 x 59 in (15.5 x 12 in each) 160 x 150 cm (40 x 30 cm each)








RICHA ARYA The Last Season, 2023

ANSHU SINGH

Anshu Singh was born in 1989 in Varanasi, India and has obtained both a Bachelor's and Master's degree in Weaving and Textile Design from the Banaras Hindu University. Her artistic journey took root in her mother's boutique, where she was exposed to the weaver's community that frequented the establishment. As a contemporary artist, her work embraces the intersection of traditional crafts and contemporary contexts. Inspired by the craftsmanship of the marginalized communities traditionally employed in embroidery ateliers, Anshu explores the possibilities afforded by unconventional materials.

Anshu has most recently participated in Fault Lines (2023), a group exhibition at Conflictorium Museum, Ahmedabad, and participated in Art & Soul Foundation's display at the 2023 India Art Fair, New Delhi. She was awarded the Young Artist Scholarship in Visual Art (2014-2015) by the Ministry of Human Resource Department, Government of India, New Delhi.

Anshu Singh lives and works in Varanasi, India.

ARTIST STATEMENT

Anshu's artistic practice pushes the boundaries between artistry and artisanship, emphasizing the importance of the artisans' authorship, particularly among women and Muslim communities who form the majority of the workforce. Her works conceptually navigate these intersections, giving voice and visibility to marginalized communities. In her recent explorations, Anshu has been experimenting with repurposed clothing, plastic, and other everyday materials, creating pieces that seamlessly blend traditional practices with contemporary contexts. Through her art, Anshu not only showcases her technical expertise but also advocates for the preservation of traditional crafts.

BIRENDER KUMAR YADAV

Birender Kumar Yadav was born in 1992 in Ballia, India and is a multimedia artist, with a Bachelor's degree in Fine Arts from Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi, and a Master's degree in Fine Arts in 2015 from the College of Arts, New Delhi. As the son of an ironsmith, he initially studied art as a way to help his father upgrade and develop new techniques. While completing his Master's thesis he began documenting the lives and stories of a group of itinerant brick kiln workers in Varanasi, an experience that has shaped his current practice. Born out of his childhood experiences of growing up in the primarily coal mining district of Dhanbad, Jharkhand, his recent works involve the same clay, as the 'bricks are the representations of the fundamental structural blocks of exploitation and erasures in our community'. He draws from memories and his personal interaction and understanding of the world around him, often collaboratively working with his family and friends who still work in these industries.

Birender had his first solo show "Idhar-Udhar" (Here-There) (2017) at Clark House Initiative. He has participated in the 12th Berlin Biennale (2022) Germany, and the 13th Bamako Encounters - African Biennale of Photography (2022), Bamako. In 2019, Birender was the recipient of the Pro-Helvetia Studio Residency, Switzerland, and the India Residency at Darling Foundry, Montreal.

Birender Kumar Yadav lives and works in New Delhi, India.

ARTIST STATEMENT

Birender's multifaceted practice draws deeply from vernacular aesthetics and indigenous ageold practices of production. For Birender, his works are a means to reconcile the conflicting
realities constructed by power structures on the one hand and the struggle-ridden everyday
life of the most oppressed on the other. He draws from the memories of his family and his
interaction and understanding of the world around him, often collaboratively working with
his family and friends who still work in these industries. His recent works mould the same
clay used by Kiln workers into large terracotta cubes, which hold within them the detritus of
the worker's nomadic lives: clothes, utensils, and other personal effects that have been worn
hard by intense use onsite. Drawing on the universal shape of the cube that he saw in their
kiln side shrines, Birender's blocks highlight the irony of these simple bricks being shaped
into malls and high rises. Similarly, he casts his iron tools in terracotta to demonstrate the
fragility of these vocations increasingly made redundant by mechanisation.

RICHA ARYA

Born in 1997 in the village of Panipat, India. Richa completed her Bachelors in Sculpture from Kurukshetra University in 2018 and her Masters in Sculpture from Delhi College of Art in 2020. The move from village to a metropolis made Richa aware of the regressive attitudes with regards to women still prevalent in her hometown, and others like it. Richa's use of an unusual material like iron, which she painstakingly pierces and embroiders might be poetically seen as the struggle to make something out of the hard life that is the norm for the women of the village.

Richa had a solo presentation of her work at Triveni Gallery (2021), New Delhi, supported by the Raza Foundation. Most recently she has participated in several group shows like at The Lexicon Art Gallery (2022), New Delhi, and with Carpe Arte (2022), Mumbai; as well as multiple artist camps and workshops. Richa has been the recipient of the Imaginarium Emami Art Award (2023) and the Prafulla Dahanukar All India Merit Award (2021). In 2022, Richa was a resident artist at Serendipity Arts Festival, New Delhi/Goa, and at Khoj Peers, New Delhi.

Richa Arya lives and works in Noida, India.

ARTIST STATEMENT

Drawing from her experience of growing up in a small village in Haryana, she creates poetic works that call into question the existing socio-cultural norms of her village, and others like it. Richa's use of an unusual material like iron, which she painstakingly pierces and embroiders might be poetically seen as the struggle to make something out of the hard life that is the norm for the women of the village. Through interviews, on-ground research, and lived experience, she creates a tapestry of images, closely associated with the home and the women who inhabit these spaces. Her stitching reveals intricate patterns, representing what she feels should be the level of cohesion and appreciation for everyone who participates in society. Richa's core belief is that 'even the smallest cog in the grand machinery of life contributes as much as its biggest'.

THAMSHANGPHA MAKU

Born in 1999 in Chandel, India, Thamshangpha Maku completed his Bachelors in Painting from the College of Art, New Delhi in 2020, and a Masters in Painting from the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda in 2022. In native communities the relationship with nature is that of coexistence and sustenance, rather than exploitation and alienation. Living away from his Naga community, Thamshangpha feels acutely the alienation and discrimination, located as he is on the periphery to the centre, i.e. the rule makers. It is these encountered experiences as well as the notion of living at the periphery that has created a dialogue within his artistic process.

In 2022, Thamshangpha participated in group shows at Anant Art Gallery, MASH India in partnership with Khoj and Priyasri Art Gallery. He was also a fellow at Immerse 2023 at Somaiya Vidyavihar University, Mumbai. In 2022, he was awarded the FICA Emerging Artist award in Delhi.

Thamshangpha Maku lives and works in Vadodara, India.

ARTIST STATEMENT

For the Manipur-born artist the forms, motifs and imagery in Naga tribal culture are born from a close observation of indigenous flora and fauna. In native communities the relationship with nature is that of coexistence and sustenance, rather than exploitation and alienation. Now based in Vadodara, he views the world differently, through layers of speculations and policies that appear to camouflage nature. Living away from his Naga community, Thamshangpha feels acutely the xenophobia and discrimination, located as he is on the periphery to the centre, i.e. the rule makers. In these circumstances, he goes back to his mother's wise words of nurture and sustenance bearing fruit. His artistic process is influenced by these experiences and the idea of being on the margin.
